A MESSAGE FROM OUR CEO & BOARD CHAIRMAN

Every child is successful, every family is financially stable, and every community we serve is stronger.

This is our vision at United Way of Monmouth and Ocean Counties (UWMOC), and it continues to guide everything we do. We are proud of the impact our organization has made over the last year and invite you to learn more about them in the following pages. Some highlights include:

Community Convener – UWMOC has a unique and important role in bringing together numerous community partner organizations to ensure our collective programs are meeting the needs of the community. Over the past year, we hosted four regional roundtables which provide opportunities for all participants to learn about gaps in services, share best practices and build collaborative partnerships.

Financial Success Centers – In January 2019, we announced the expansion of our Financial Success Center (FSC) Network from our original location in The Freehold Raceway Mall to nine additional locations throughout Monmouth and Ocean counties. Recently, we received a grant from the National Council on Aging to provide FSC services targeted to seniors and people with disabilities. To elevate the skill base of our FSC partners and other community providers, we sponsored financial training and coaching led by Neighborworks, a nationally recognized nonprofit. The FSC Network of nine partners are all committed to the same goal – helping the 39% of the families in our region that are struggling to make ends meet.

Focus on Youth – Over the past year, we regionalized our school readiness, summer literacy and school-based nurse practitioner programs. We also recently launched a grant process in our newest focus area, Youth Career Pathways, focusing on assisting youth create a vision and plan for their future. None of this important work can happen without the financial support of UWMOC donors. We would like to thank all of our donors and those that increased their giving over the past year as we work together to meet the Grunin Foundation \$1 Million Challenge. Through this Challenge, any new funds raised through 2021 will be matched dollar for dollar up to \$1 million. As of January 2019, we are 63% of the way to meeting this challenge — and we need your support to get us to 100%.

In spring 2019, UWMOC will also be starting a new era with the retirement of our long-time President & CEO, Timothy Hearne. We thank Tim for his outstanding leadership and service, and welcome our new President & CEO Lori-Anne McLane to the UWMOC family.

As we continue to improve the lives of youth and their families in Monmouth and Ocean Counties, we thank all of our donors, volunteers and community partners for their continued support in our commitment to LIVE UNITED.



EQUIPPING PARENTS, CAREGIVERS AND PROVIDERS WITH THE TOOLS NEEDED TO ADDRESS EARLY LITERACY AND THE HEALTH DETERMINANTS OF EARLY SCHOOL SUCCESS FOR THEIR CHILDREN.

DID YOU KNOW?

- By age five, a typical middle-class child recognizes 22 letters of the alphabet, compared to 9 for a child from a low-income family.
- Learning begins long before Kindergarten; children, even infants, soak up rhymes, songs and images.
- As a child's first teacher, brain builder, advocate and coach, parents set the stage for success in the early years.

EARLY GRADE READING

ENSURING STUDENTS ARE LEARNING, ENGAGED AND HEALTHY OVER THE SUMMER MONTHS AND READY FOR SCHOOL IN SEPTEMBER.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Reading proficiency by the end of third grade enables students to shift from learning to read to reading to learn. Students who fail to meet this milestone often do not graduate high school.
- Without access to enriching activities over the summer, children from low-income families lose as much as 3 months of reading comprehension skills.



## Every community, regardless of the size and socioeconomic status, benefits greatly from volunteers.

United Way of Monmouth and Ocean Counties' Volunteer Center recruits individuals, families, organizations and corporations and matches them with meaningful volunteer opportunities at local nonprofit agencies. We make volunteering easy, flexible and impactful for the individual while helping agencies meet their goals.

The Volunteer Center also provides donations to Monmouth and Ocean County residents through various community drives. We partner with local schools and nonprofits that have a pulse on the community to determine the demand for items and enlist the help of companies to acquire donations. In the winter, our Warmest Wishes drive gives children brand-new coats, hats, mittens and scarves to keep them warm on the way to and from school. We also coordinate book drives with local companies to collect new and gently used books for students in our summer literacy programs.

#### Women United is a group inspired to make a real change in the lives of children and families.

We ignite the power of women – who bring the passion, expertise, and resources needed to get things done – to create lasting change in our community.

Our current focus is early grade reading and combating the summer slide. In the summer months, children with limited access to books and activities fall behind. Each year a child is without these resources, the learning gap widens. If the learning gap remains by the end of the third grade, they will never catch up to their peers. Funds raised advance our work in education and help children read to learn, instead of learn to read, by the start of the fourth grade.

## In 2018, Women United funded summer literacy programs at AMP Zone, Horizons at Rumson Country Day School and the Ocean County YMCA.




