A MESSAGE FROM OUR CEO & BOARD CHAIRMAN

Over the past year, United Way of Monmouth and Ocean Counties (UWMOC) continued our unrelenting focus on making an impact in our communities. We are proud of our accomplishments and determined to face the current challenging environment. Among our important activities, UWMOC completed the Grunin Foundation \$1 Million Challenge to help further our mission and enrich our critical programs. In Spring 2019, we welcomed Lori-Anne McLane as our new President & CEO to lead our organization into a new era.

UWMOC announced the expansion of our Financial Success Center (FSC) Network to ten locations throughout Monmouth and Ocean counties to provide more access to services than ever before. Through a grant from the National Council on Aging, we also provided services targeted to seniors and people with disabilities. Our School-Based Nurse Practitioner partnership expanded to an additional school in Toms River. With a new partner in our Youth Career Pathways focus area, we are providing high school students with hands-on training in the tech, manufacturing and construction industries.

One change we never could have imagined in 2019 is the challenges our organization, our community and the entire world would face in 2020 from the COVID-19 pandemic. UWMOC quickly organized a COVID-19 Recovery Fund to address the unmet needs of people and organizations economically impacted by this crisis. While we're doing all that we can to mitigate the immediate effects of the virus, we remain committed to helping rebuild our communities over the near and long term.

UWMOC is rebuilding for better, more equitable and more resilient communities. Our goal is not to "return to normal." We need to reimagine a new normal that equips our residents to weather inevitable future crises. United

Way is unparalleled in our power to convene partners, providers and resources to address the needs of our community. Together, we will overcome this health and economic crisis. 

ENSURING STUDENTS ARE LEARNING, ENGAGED AND HEALTHY OVER THE SUMMER MONTHS AND READY FOR SCHOOL IN SEPTEMBER.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Reading proficiency by the end of third grade enables students to shift from learning to read to reading to learn. Students who fail to meet this milestone often do not graduate high school.
- Without access to enriching activities over the summer, children from low-income families lose as much as 3 months of reading comprehension skills.





WOMEN UNITED

Women United is a diverse, vibrant group of leaders working to make a direct impact in our community.

We ignite the power of women who bring the passion, expertise, and resources needed to get things done to improve the lives of children and their families.

In conjunction with United Way of Monmouth and Ocean Counties, the current focus of Women United is combating the summer slide. In the summer months, children with limited access to books and activities fall behind. Each year a child is without these resources, the learning gap widens. If the learning gap remains by the end of the third grade, they may never catch up to their peers. Funds raised advance our work in education and help children transition to reading to learn, instead of learning to read, by the start of the fourth grade.

In 2019, Women United helped fund the UWMOC summer literacy programs at AMP Zone, Collier Youth Services, Community YMCA, Girl Scouts of the Jersey Shore, Monmouth Day Care Center, O.C.E.A.N. Inc., and Ocean County YMCA.






